STRATEGIC ALIGNMENT – NOW MORE THAN EVER

For more than 26 years, OYEP has been closing the very gaps that are now making national headlines. While others are only beginning to design solutions for youth employment and education inequities, we've been quietly proving what works.

Canada faces its highest youth unemployment rate in decades at 14.7%, with teens hardest hit at over 20%. For Indigenous youth, systemic education barriers and geographic isolation compound the challenge, limiting access to stable, meaningful work. At the same time, employers report a growing skills mismatch as automation and green transitions reshape the labour market. Youth without early work experience risk long-term effects on earnings and career stability.

The solution has always been clear to us: education and on-the-job skills development must go hand in hand. Research shows that work-integrated learning is one of the safest, most effective ways to prepare youth for the workforce and achieving future life goals. It builds real-world competencies, fosters confidence, and creates pathways to sustainable careers.

OYEP isn't a funding gamble. It's a proven model ready to scale. The time to invest in what works is now. The future depends on it.

THE \$27 BILLION OPPORTUNITY

Closing the Indigenous employment gap is an economic imperative. According to the Conference Board of Canada, eliminating barriers to Indigenous workforce participation could add up to \$27.7 billion annually to Canada's GDP, a figure that reflects critical untapped potential in every sector.

INNOVATION & SKILLS – PREPARING TOMORROW'S WORKFORCE

OYEP brings together two ways of learning and understanding the world: Indigenous knowledge and Western science. Both have value, and both shape how youth see their futures. Youth build practical skills in trades, construction, forestry, and environmental science, while also learning from traditional teachings about land, stewardship, and community. This approach highlights how knowledge systems can complement one another. When youth see how traditional knowledge connects with science and technology, they discover new ways to solve problems and innovate. Respect for the land and cultural understanding strengthen technical learning, creating a more holistic perspective.

Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math and Trades Week

exemplifies this balance, bridging Western science with Indigenous knowledge. Through partnerships with post-secondary institutions, youth explore science and trades programs, while engaging in cultural teachings led by Elders, peers, and Indigenous support centres. Living and learning on campus creates a grounded, identity-driven experience that connects culture, education, and career exploration.









The impact of this integration is evident in the experience of Amelia, a first-year participant from McLeod Lake Indian Band. Amelia completed wildfire certification training delivered by the National Indigenous Fire Safety Council (NIFSC), a new OYEP partner in 2025, and was subsequently invited to the 2025 Indigenous Public Safety Conference in Calgary. Her mother, Andrea, reflected on the experience:

"This summer helped my daughter grow and come out of her shell. She is now a striving young lady with a voice! Amelia was struggling last year with identity and mental health. This experience was a game changer for her."

THEORY OF CHANGE - OYEP'S HOLISTIC MODEL

OYEP supports young people in building skills, earning credentials, and gaining confidence through hands-on work integrated learning. The program connects youth with mentors, employers, community leaders, and peers, creating pathways to good jobs, further education, and brighter futures. By meeting basic needs and offering tailored support, OYEP removes barriers and creates a space to support youth to succeed in school, work, and life.









OYEP recognizes that Indigenous youth often face unique barriers to mainstream education and employment, resulting in gaps compared to national standards. By providing hands-on work integrated learning, mentorship, and tailored support, OYEP helps bridge these disparities and opens pathways for youth to achieve their full potential.



THE ACTION

OYEP provides youth with opportunities to learn new skills and earn industry-recognized certificates, gain real work experience through a paid summer job, connect with mentors and community and industry leaders, participate in cultural activities and learn from Elders, and earn high school credits while exploring post-secondary pathways.



ENVIRONMENT SETTING

OYEP makes sure youth have everything they need including food, a safe place to stay, transportation, and tailored supports. The program meets youth where they are, listens to their needs, and supports them in finding their own path to success.



THE RESULT

Youth feel more confident and prepared for work, more young people finish high school and continue into further education, and participants build strong relationships and a national network. They develop lasting friendships and leadership skills, while employers benefit from talented, motivated, and safetyminded young workers.



WHY DOES IT MATTER?

At OYEP, Indigenous youth take the lead in shaping their own futures. Youth actively participate in hands-on work experiences, skills training, and cultural activities that expose them to all kinds of possibilities for their future. Supported by a network of peers, mentors, and community partners, youth drive the program, close education and employment gaps, and create lasting change. OYEP provides the opportunity for young people to develop the tools, confidence, and connections they need to become leaders, building a stronger, more sustainable, and inclusive Canada for all.







YOUNG INDIGENOUS LEADERS - GROWING FROM WITHIN

Real Voices, Real Impact: Alumni Stories that Spark Change

More than half of OYEP's management team are program alumni, a testament to the pathways OYEP creates for ambitious youth. Many start as youth, develop leadership skills as crew leaders, and rise to senior roles guided by mentorship and personalized coaching. This progression helps young people build confidence, career-ready skills, and a strong sense of purpose. Graduates often launch into meaningful careers after their time at OYEP, showcasing the program's lasting impact on youth achievement.

Indigenous Management Stream

Neepin Cook's journey with OYEP exemplifies the program's commitment to capacity building and Indigenous leadership development. Beginning as a participant in 2020, Neepin advanced from Junior Staff in 2021 to Crew Leader in 2023 and now serves as an OYEP Program Supervisor in 2025. Her leadership growth reflects both her dedication and the supportive, skills-based environment OYEP provides. Reflecting on her experience as a Crew Leader, Neepin shared, "Working with so many individuals from different communities, and learning their stories, has really honed my goal of advocating for Indigenous communities and given me motivation to do what I want to do." This statement highlights the confidence and leadership capacity she gained through experience, mentorship, and trust. Currently completing her third year in Indigenous and Environmental Studies at the University of Winnipeg, and lasting impact of OYEP's approach to youth empowerment and leadership development.

- Wrap around supports ensure youth are ready for career transitions
- Strong partnerships with industry leaders create real-world opportunities

Timothy Twoyoungmen joined OYEP in 2022 as a participant in Alberta, returning for two summers before stepping into a Crew Leader in Training leadership role in 2024. Through his time with OYEP, he developed strong leadership, and teamwork skills that prepared him for the next step in his career. In spring 2025, OYEP's partnership network created a new opportunity when Jason Mogilefski of West Fraser Cochrane reached out about a research assistant position on a joint water research project between West Fraser and the University of Waterloo. OYEP staff connected Tim with the hiring team, and he was successfully selected for the internship. Following its completion in the fall, West Fraser offered Tim fulltime employment. This success story demonstrates how OYEP's leadership progression pathway and wrap around supports help youth transition from early intervention skills development into meaningful, long-term careers in the natural resource sector, supported by industry partnerships that remove barriers and champion inclusive employment.





PURPOSE-DRIVEN PARTNERSHIPS

Collective Impact for Indigenous Youth

Long-term funding turns OYEP from a seasonal program into a sustained pathway for Indigenous youth. Multi-year commitments provide stability, support program growth, and allow for innovation without interruption. We are deeply grateful to partners, who invest in long-term impact and set a standard for public good. Their commitment strengthens communities and helps build a more equitable Canada. OYEP honours these leaders and invites governments, businesses, and communities to join in shaping a strong future for Indigenous youth.







Community Based Support

OYEP is strengthened by deep partnerships with Indigenous communities and Indigenousled organizations across the country. Partners such as Apitipi Anicinapek Nation, Anishinabek Employment and Training Services (AETS), Manitoba Keewatinowi Okimakanak (MKO), and other community organizations ensure the program is guided by local direction and communityidentified priorities. They provide financial support, coordinate recruitment, explore and advocate for alternative systems, and help facilitate in community work experiences. Elders and community leaders offer mentorship and guidance that connect youth learning to community well-being. Together, these collaborations make OYEP a pathway for self-determination, two-way capacity building, and systems innovation to support the development of future Indigenous leaders.



Alberta's Forestry Sector: Investing in the Future

FRIAA: The Forest Resource Improvement Association of Alberta (FRIAA) approved a multi-year funding proposal through the Forest Resource Improvement Program (FRIP), securing millions in support until 2032. This long-term investment ensures program stability and growth across Alberta.

Partnerships at OYEP extend far beyond financial support. Through collaboration with West Fraser, we connected with the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology to access their Kidney Lake Field School as OYEP's home for the summer, an example of how strategic partnerships amplify opportunity, enhance learning environments, and demonstrate the value of shared commitment to Indigenous youth success.



Bioenergy & Climate Solutions

Drax: As OYEP's largest bioenergy partner, Drax contributed \$100,000 and hosted a youth engagement event in BC. Their support ensured continuity for the 2025 season and reflects a deep commitment to community and climate action.



Iron & Earth: Focused on community-driven climate solutions, Iron & Earth partnered with OYEP for the second year, delivering three days of renewable energy programming at Alberta South. Their mission to embed Truth and Reconciliation into every aspect of their work aligns seamlessly with OYEP's values.



Keyera: A New Partner in 2025, Keyera contributed \$100,000 to support OYEP. Their partnership included a youth tour of the Alberta Energy Foundation facility and participation in closing ceremonies. Keyera's commitment to Indigenous communities is reflected in their support for education, training, and capacity building.







Mining and Critical Minerals

OYEP's strong relationships with Canada's mining sector continue to create meaningful, hands-on learning opportunities for youth. This summer, youth explored the world of mineral exploration through prospecting activities, geological mapping, and underground mine tours hosted by industry partners. These immersive experiences connected classroom learning to real world applications, showcased diverse career paths in mining and natural resources, and reinforced the importance of industry collaboration in building future ready Indigenous leaders.



Hands-On Skill Building

Partnerships with organizations like Iron & Earth and Trans Canada Trail (TCT) bring realworld experiences to camp. Youth build trails, restore landscapes, learn about the renewable power of the wind and the sun, gaining pride in their work.


FINANCIALS - FUNDING THE FUTURE

What does a youth get?

- At no cost to participate, each youth has the opportunity to gain a whole load more than a summer job.
- · All meals, accommodations, and transportation are covered.
- Industry-recognized training and certifications that youth receive support real career paths.
- A chance to earn high school credits, take part in cultural activities, and build confidence through hands-on experience.
- Being part of a national network of peers, mentors, and industry leaders, who are shaping the future of Canada's natural resource sector.
